

Letter From Laura

Thomas Long, in his book *Testimony*, writes of making a final visit to an old friend the weekend before Christmas. His friend lay in an upstairs bedroom, attended by friends and folks from hospice. Tom went in and sat beside his friend. They did not have much to say. Both of them knew it would be his friend's last Christmas. His friend could do nothing without help, and death, only a few weeks away from claiming him, was already an intruder in the room. His friend was in constant pain, his face grey and taut and ravaged by disease. They sat in the stillness of old friends content with silence, saying farewell with quietness.

Suddenly there was movement downstairs, the sounds of muffled voices, the shuffle of feet. It was a choir from his church come to sing Christmas carols. They could hear them whispering about what to sing to a dying man. Their voices started softly, "Lo how a rose e'er blooming...." Tom and his friend looked at each other and waited as the choir slowly climbed the stairs, their voices growing nearer and stronger — "to show God's love aright." The choir stood in the doorway, continuing the verses. Tom's friend, deep into the darkness of dying and still agonizing



What Tom marveled about as he listened to this mournful yet hopeful song was how the choir, having spent countless Wednesday nights mastering the lyrics and the tunes, the meters and the meanings of hundreds of choral expressions of the faith, had chosen just right for this moment. They knew, as people schooled in the language of faith, that the "night is dark and we are far from home." They knew they needed to sing both truthfully and hopefully, to lament as well as to rejoice, with their fellow congregant and so they sang of God's love coming "when half-spent was the night." (directly from *Testimony*, Jossey-Bass, 2004, 33-4)

As the days shorten and winter begins, as we huddle in more and venture out less, we also draw closer and closer to Bethlehem. As we journey with Joseph and Mary this year, let us remember that "Christianity is a way of life learned in the midst of others." (ibid, 35) It is not just about belonging and believing, but pursuing a certain way of life. Come home for Christmas at UPC this year. From Blue Christmas to the Family Christmas Shop to a Celtic Christmas to the Christmas Festival to Lessons and Carols, to leaving the church at midnight on Christmas Eve, to the telling of the old, old story again on the last Sunday of the year, there is much here "to show God's love aright." See you soon.

Blue Christmas Service

Hosted by Worship and the Arts, this service to be held on Sunday, December 1 at 3:00 pm isn't just for UPC folks, but a wonderful way for you to reach out to friends, relatives and neighbors who are grieving and provide you the opportunity to show your compassion as we move towards Christmas. A Blue Christmas service is especially for those for whom Christmas is a difficult time, which can happen for many reasons, including a recent personal loss; depression; an association with painful Christmases past; separation from loved ones; or a feeling of intense disconnection from the prevailing secularism of Christmas. This service gives space and time away from the hype of Christmas and an opportunity to experience a sacred presence amidst our lives which are sometimes awkward, uncomfortable, and messy.

Christingle Service Returns to the December VIVID service

A Christingle Service is a service of light and ceremony, of song and symbol, and familiar stories of Jesus' birth. Christingle means "Christ light," and the service focuses our attention on the hope and joy that light brings to a dark world. In the dark of winter, the coming of Christ, the light of the world, is a powerful message of hope. A Christingle is made from an orange, which represents the world that God made, and a candle, which represents Jesus, the light of the world. Together, we will begin the evening by each of us making our own Christingles, and then using them as the central part of the evening's worship. As always at a VIVID service, our time of worship ends with a community meal. You will especially delight in this old Moravian traditional Christmas Eve service if you will be traveling over Christmas this year. This is a wonderful opportunity to join your UPC church family in candlelit worship early, during the Advent season. Join us at 4:00 pm on Sunday, December 8th for the VIVID Christingle Service. Enter through the south patio doors into a beautiful, creative, intimate inter-generational worship service unlike any other worship service we have at UPC.

Monarch Day 2019 Update

Our first proposal was for a competitive grant funded by the General Assembly of Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to support initiatives which combined *advocacy for the environment and evangelism*. Our proposal was selected by all the reviewing committees from our own session all the way up to the General Assembly. We were



partially funded for \$1000. The Presbytery of Great Rivers, however, liked our mission and plan when they reviewed it and decided to provide additional funds of \$2640 to fully fund our request. Nature Connections feels blessed by the interest

Holidays and Stress Management

As we approach the holiday season, it may be a good time to plan ways to manage stress. Depression and stress can ruin the holidays and take a toll on health. The holidays can create stress related to entertaining, parties, shopping, baking, and cleaning to name a few. However, following some practical tips may help minimize this stress. It is important to acknowledge your feelings of sadness or grief during the holidays. You can't force yourself to be happy just because it is the holiday season. If you are feeling isolated or lonely, reach out for community support. There may be religious or social events that can offer support and companionship. Another way to lift your spirits and make new friends may be to volunteer.

Another tip to consider is being realistic with holiday expectations. The holiday celebrations don't have to be perfect or the same year after year. As families grow and change, so can traditions and rituals of the past. It may be helpful to set aside grievances during the holidays, and to accept friends and family members as they are. Sticking with a budget during the holiday season may also help decrease stress. Deciding how much money you plan to spend before going shopping may help.

Setting aside specific days for different holiday activities such as shopping and baking may be helpful in combating stress. A Christmas Pageant Casting Call?

This article was written by Susan Davis Krummel, who grew up in First Presbyterian of Peoria and currently serves as the Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Chicago, reprinted from 11/10/2019 of Presbytery Connect, the eletter of the Presbytery of Chicago.

During the year before I came to Chicago Presbytery, I was serving a small church as interim pastor and lived full time in Peoria. I have always loved theater of all kinds and, in fact, my undergraduate degree is a performance degree in Speech Communications from Illinois. There were only about 100 of us in that major while I was there and most of the other people were heading toward television. In any case, during 2017 I had enough free evenings to be able to try out for a show and was cast with a very small part in the chorus. It was fun to see the show from the backstage end of it and to help out with all of the kids who were in it.

I also discovered that the community theater groups in Peoria all operate on Facebook. That is how you find out that you made the show; how you are informed about the rehearsal schedule and on and on. Now that I do not have time to be in a show, I still keep in touch with the two theater groups on Facebook since that is also where they ask for volunteers. I saw a few shows for free this summer under the tent in Bradley Park where summer productions are done by volunteering to be an usher.

Because of the Facebook connections, I also see some of the announcements for the very active children's community theater groups in Peoria. I have noticed that one of the ways both the indoor and outdoor theaters help to fill their seats is by choosing shows that have lots of kids in them. If all of their family members pay for tickets (and some of them, of course, come almost every night) it helps to keep the theater afloat. Many of these kids take acting and singing and dancing classes all year round. They are always on the lookout for places to audition to show off their budding talents.

I know that this time of year is crunch time for those involved with children's ministry in churches. I was a youth pastor in one of my calls and was involved in youth ministry in almost every church I served. I have directed children's pageants where no one really learned their lines and our Sunday morning pageant looked more like a bad rehearsal. I have had the lead (who knew all of his lines) walk up to me about 30 minutes before the pageant was to begin and tell me that he thought he was going to throw up. (I told him to go find his mother. Someone read from a script to fill in for him.) I have had kids get microphone cords so twisted around someone else's legs that we had to stop for a minute to right the ship.

The best one may have been the program with about 100 children and teen-agers all standing at the front of the sanctuary while someone was videotaping. (This was a long time ago so it really was taped.) You could see that something happened that made children and teens alike react by stepping back and then giggling uncontrollably. It was really funny to watch on the video. Apparently one of the little ones had (ahem) had a few too many beans for dinner, if you know what I mean, and the result set off a mini-riot in the program we had been rehearsing for weeks.

With the way that even active church members attend worship only about once a month now, I cannot imagine trying to put on one of these extravaganzas. How can you rehearse during Sunday School if kids are only there occasionally? How can you choose the day for the pageant? And, for those churches with a handful of children or no children, do you have to abandon the tradition altogether?

I wonder. . . what if you advertised in the community theater groups near your church that there will be auditions for kids for this production, that rehearsals will be held at set times, and that the production will be held on a particular date? I wonder if children from your community who like to perform might be part of your pageant as a part of their performance life for the year.

Does that seem like sacrilege to you? Think about it. What is the purpose of the Christmas pageant? Is it to provide a place to show off Christmas dresses and ties; a time to do what we have always done; one more thing to add stress to the lives of the families in your congregation and your paid and volunteer staff? Or is the purpose to help those involved to understand the great gift we receive at Christmas in a new way? Is a part of the purpose to introduce this story to those who have never heard anything about Christmas except that it is a time to ask for something?

For our congregations to survive and thrive, we need to be creative in the ways we reach beyond our current members and friends. Does that mean inviting strangers to be part of the Christmas pageant? That is for you to decide. But it might be an interesting conversation to have. Why have Christmas pageants been important in the past? What is their true purpose? How do they remind us of our purpose as a church: to bring hope in the name of Jesus Christ every hour of every day?
